WHO WE ARE: SEPAC Responsibilities

Responsibilities (per MA law)

- Advise the district on matters that pertain to the education and safety of students with disabilities
- Meet regularly with School Officials
- Establish Bylaws
- Receive assistance from School Committee (as needed)
- In cooperation with the district, provide an annual workshop on the rights of students and their parents and guardians under state and federal special education laws (Basic Rights Training)

Additional Focus

- Build awareness of SEPAC with parents in the district
- Support parents through the IEP process
- Offer workshops and speakers
- Work to build a community for Special Education parents, caregivers, and families

What we don't do

- Offer legal, medical, professional advice
- Resolve specific IEP issues
- Attend IEP meetings with parents

CURRENT CONCERNS - what people are talking about

Desire for consistency between schools

- RTI practices and the language used to describe them
- Inconsistency leads to lack of confidence that 1) RTI is in fact being executed in the same way at all schools and 2) that there is a clear path from participation in RTI to evaluation for special education for students who continue to struggle after prolonged participation in RTI
- When is an intervention SEL RTI and when is it discipline?

CURRENT CONCERNS - what people are talking about

State dyslexia screening guidelines

- Intense interest in what upcoming guidelines could they mean for Natick, e.g., will schools be able to diagnose dyslexia?
- Hope that new state guidelines will result in changes to NPS practices that will identify students with dyslexia earlier
- Hope that new guidelines will lead to changes in available approaches and interventions for students with dyslexia

CURRENT CONCERNS - what people are talking about

Title 1

- Continued questions about the changes in deployment of Title 1 resources across elementary schools, frustration with the way changes were communicated
- What happens to kids who qualified for and received Title 1 reading and math tutoring and now receive no supports?
- How are students identified for Title 1 supports?
- Is there a difference between Title 1 and RTI?
